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Notice of Data Breach

Dear <<First_Name>> <<Last_Name>>,

SuccessfulMatch.com (the “Company”) is contacting you to inform you about a data security incident that may have exposed some of your personal information. We take the protection and proper use of your information very seriously. For this reason, we are contacting you directly to explain the circumstances of the incident.

What Happened

The Company recently ascertained that on approximately March 18, 2022, a user of one of our websites, in an effort to provide a suggestion to the Company about ways the Company could improve its security for its websites: (i) accessed certain personal information of certain end users of our websites through the use of a web crawler; and (ii) then notified the Company through the feedback portal that he had done so in order to inform the Company of ways the Company should improve its website security procedures (hereinafter referred to as the “**Web Crawler Incident**”). At this time, we are not aware of any misuse of your personal or financial information as a result of this Web Crawler Incident.

What Information Was Involved

Based on our investigations, it appears that the following types of personal information of certain users of our websites were involved in the Web Crawler Incident: Social Security numbers, certain Tax Identification Numbers, and certain account numbers.

What We Are Doing

We have worked with our security team in order to: (i) identify the vulnerability associated with this Web Crawler Incident; and (ii) take action to remedy the identified vulnerability, including taking steps to ensure that the pages that contained the applicable personal information were scrubbed of information, and to patch any issues which would prevent any future web crawlers from accessing this information; (iii) we have partnered with a third-party information and data security company to scan our website for vulnerabilities and upgrade or improve our software or systems; and (iv) we have hired security experts to monitor our system for more possible security bugs; and (v) we have improved our internal policy to encourage our engineers to spot more possible security bugs.

What You Can Do

We are currently unaware of any fraud or misuse concerning the personal information that may have been exposed.

Please review the enclosed “Additional Resources” section below. This section describes additional steps you can take to help protect your information, including recommendations by the Federal Trade Commission regarding identity theft protection and details on how to place a fraud alert or a security freeze on your credit file.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES AND ADDITIONAL STEPS YOU CAN TAKE

1. Review your credit reports. We recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and monitoring credit reports. Under federal law, you also are entitled every 12 months to one free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit-reporting companies. To obtain a free annual credit report, go to www.annualcreditreport.com or call 1-877-322-8228. You may wish to stagger your requests so that you receive a free report by one of the three credit bureaus every four months.

You should also know that you have the right to file a police report if you ever experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide some kind of proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

2. Place Fraud Alerts with the three credit bureaus. If you choose to place a fraud alert, we recommend you do this after activating your credit monitoring. You can place a fraud alert at one of the three major credit bureaus by phone and also via Experian's or Equifax's website. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. The contact information for all three bureaus is as follows:

Please Note: No one is allowed to place a fraud alert on your credit report except you.

3. Security Freeze. By placing a security freeze, someone who fraudulently acquires your personal identifying information will not be able to use that information to open new accounts or borrow money in your name. You will need to contact the three national credit reporting bureaus listed above to place the freeze. Keep in mind that when you place the freeze, you will not be able to borrow money, obtain instant credit, or get a new credit card until you temporarily lift or permanently remove the freeze.

4. You can obtain additional information about the steps you can take to avoid identity theft from the following agencies. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them.

New Mexico Residents: You have rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as the right to be told if information in your credit file has been used against you, the right to know what is in your credit file, the right to ask for your credit score, and the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to your file is limited; you must give your consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; you may limit "prescreened" offers of credit

and insurance you get based on information in your credit report; and you may seek damages from a violator. You may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
