Butler Snow LLP ("Butler Snow") writes to notify you of an incident that may affect the privacy of some of your information. Butler Snow received your information as a result of its legal representation of Ethicon, Inc. and related entities in various pelvic mesh lawsuits in the United States (including *In re: Ethicon, Inc. Pelvic Repair System Products Liability Litigation* (Cause No. 2:12-MDL-2327 in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia) and/or *In re: Pelvic Mesh/Gynecare Litigation* (In the Superior Court of New Jersey, Law Division) in which you may have been either a litigant or participated in a settlement. Although we have no evidence of any identity theft or fraud occurring as a result of this incident, this letter provides details of the incident, our response, and resources available to you to help protect your information from possible misuse, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On May 3, 2023, Butler Snow became aware of suspicious activity on its computer network. Butler Snow immediately launched an investigation, with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity forensic specialists. Through our investigation, we determined that an unauthorized actor may have had access to certain systems that stored personal information on May 3, 2023. A thorough and time-intensive review of the impacted systems was conducted to determine if any personal information may have been impacted within the system and to whom that information relates. This review was completed on August 15, 2023.

What Information Was Involved? Our investigation determined the following types of your information may have been impacted by this incident: your name, and [Extra2]. At this time, we have no indication that your information was subject to actual or attempted misuse as a result of this incident.

What We Are Doing. Data privacy and security are among Butler Snow's highest priorities, and there are extensive measures in place to protect information in Butler Snow's care. Upon discovery, Butler Snow promptly commenced an investigation with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity specialists to confirm the nature and scope of this incident. This investigation and response included confirming the security of our systems, reviewing the contents of relevant data for sensitive information, and identifying impacted individuals associated with that sensitive information. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy and security of personal information in our care, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures, providing additional training to employees, and implementing additional safeguards to further secure information in our systems. We will also notify applicable regulatory authorities, as required by law. Butler Snow notified law enforcement and is cooperating with its investigation.

As an added precaution, we are also offering twenty-four (24) months of complimentary access to credit monitoring services through Experian. Individuals who wish to receive these services must enroll by following the attached enrollment instructions.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the information contained in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information*. There you will also find more information on the complimentary credit monitoring services being made available to you. While Butler Snow will cover the cost of these services, you will need to enroll yourself in the services we are offering, if you would like to do so.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a one-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer's name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General.
